CRATER LAKE, OREGON - Crater Lake National Park has issued a **Level 1 Evacuation Notice for Mazama Village** effective at 1:00 PM, August 27, 2017. The Level 1 notice informs residents and visitors to "be ready" for a potential evacuation of Mazama Village, including employee dormitories and trailer sites, in the event that the Blanket Creek Fire approaches these areas. Current or projected threats from the approaching fire indicate that there may be a need to evacuate in the future, however, there are no mandatory evacuations at this time. Rim Village, park headquarters and other areas in the park are not affected by this Level 1 notice.

## Wild Fire News


### North Pelican Fire Update, August 27th

The return of warmer and drier weather made the lightning-caused North Pelican fire become more active yesterday on the North, South and Western perimeters. Favorable weather conditions and clearer skies allowed for the use of aerial resources, which lined the western edge with retardant. The retardant drops helped to slow fire progression into a dense stand of timber along the ridgeline.

Over the weekend, temperatures have gradually increased, relative humidity continues to decrease and light winds with up to 15mph gusts are all contributing factors to the fire's movement. Firefighters continued mop-up efforts, strengthening the fire's contingency lines and reinforcing its eastern perimeter. At this time, contingency lines have been completed. A continued safety concern is snag/hazard trees. Safety crews are vigilantly working to locate and remove these area hazards.

The Fremont-Winema National Forest Area Closure remains in place. The Westside Road is completely open and unaffected by the closure order as it is not a Forest Service road. However, all forestlands adjacent to the road are closed. The perimeter of the Area Closure includes all Forest Lands west of Westside Road, east of Pelican Butte Road, north of the 3554 Road, and south of 3519 Road. If traveling on Westside Road or through the Rocky Point area, please be vigilant and drive with caution as emergency traffic vehicles are in the area. When smoke is visible, motorists are encouraged to drive with their headlights on. Please use extreme caution when driving near firefighters and equipment.

With the conglomerate of residual smoke in the area, knowing the local air quality is essential for residents. A fire crew from Puerto Rico is here in Southern Oregon working on the Falcon Complex in Douglas County.



## The Earth

It's mid-August, the start of fall migration. Adult monarchs are partway through their lifecycle, but their reproduction is on hold. These monarchs are different from their parents, grandparents and great grandparents. Previous generations completed their life cycle in four weeks. Each of these generations migrated north, resulting in four generations this summer. But these butterflies are members of the generation that migrates south, often called the monarch 'super generation.'

Imagine the journey- flying more than 3,000 miles to Mexico, not knowing where you can rest or where you will have your next meal. The sun is your guide on daily flights, traveling about 50 miles a day. You often catch "free rides" on thermal air currents, sometimes flying a mile high. When rain splashes down, the wind blows strong, or your body temp drops below 86 degrees, you are unable to fly.

Decreasing day length and temperatures, along with aging milkweed and other nectar sources triggers the birth of the super generation and their epic migration. They live eight times longer than their parents and grandparents- up to eight months, and travel 10 times farther.

There will be a lot of water, yes, but plenty of other consequences, too. Floods have habit of surfacing things we'd rather stay hidden.

Humans, for example, aren't the only ones looking for higher ground. Alligators are too. Rising waters have also carried snakes from their natural habitats to where humans congregate.

In New Orleans, floodwaters from Hurricane Katrina unearthed nearly a thousand coffins and vaults, sending the dead miles along the coast.

## Stray dogs dyed blue

The Maharashtra Pollution Control Board just shut down a manufacturing company in Mumbai, India, after some unlikely whistleblowers drew attention to the pollutants the company was dumping in the Kasadi river. Arati Chauhan, head of the Navi Mumbai Animal Protection Cell, told The Hindustan Times, that more than one dog was spotted by the river with blue fur. Chauhan wrote, "Pollutants from Talaja Industrial area not only ruining the water bodies affecting humans there but also affecting Animals, Birds, Reptiles. Blue dye entering water bodies," continuing with, "Consuming polluted water leads to Cancer, Liver, Kidney damage. Skin irritation, rashes, if comes in contact with eyes may lead to Blindness".



The Hindustan Times reports that the source of the dye was untreated industrial waste being released into both the air and water from a private company, Ducol Organics. When the firm was inspected, the pollution board discovered they'd been taking no measures to clean or treat the water they were dumping in the water. Chauhan, however, is not satisfied with the actions of the board, as regulation is an issue for all companies in the area. "Shutting down one industry, as MPCB has done, only results in daily wage laborers losing their bread and butter. There are many other industries in the area that pose a threat to the flora, fauna and a threat of more such cases is a possibility," she said. "There is a need for pollution monitoring of all plants and development of adequate green cover around industrial sites."

On the bright side, all five dogs were examined by veterinarians and one was tested for pathologies. The dye is water soluble and they seem to have suffered no permanent ill effects. They were only unwitting guard dogs briefly facing off against pollution.

## Kelp Forests in Decline Worldwide

Among the world's most diverse marine ecosystems, kelp forests are found on all continental coastlines except for Antarctica and provide critical food and shelter to myriad fish and other creatures. Kelp also is critical to coastal economies, providing billions of dollars in tourism and fishing.

Now there is a growing list of global hotspots losing their kelp, including hundreds of miles in the Mediterranean Sea, off southern Japan and Australia, and parts of the California coast. The Pacific Coast from northern California to the Oregon border is one place that suffered dramatic kelp loss. Since 2014, aerial surveys have shown that bull kelp declined by over 90 percent.

Kelp losses on Australia's Great Southern Reef threaten tourism and fishing industries worth \$10 billion. Die-offs contributed to a 60 percent drop in species richness in the Mediterranean and were blamed for the collapse of the abalone fishery in Japan.

The likely culprit, according to several scientific studies, is warming oceans from climate change, coupled with the arrival of invasive species.

Money is raised through fund-raising projects such as a Thanksgiving turkey dinner fixings raffle with tickets being sold at Kirchers Hardware; Christmas Boutique at the Chiloquin Community Center; Kaleidoscope of Learning at Mazama High School in Klamath Falls. We are very active in our community and you will find FCE volunteers at many local events.

Oregon FCE is a non-profit organization of volunteers who have worked on such issues as improving sanitary requirements in hospitals, women's labor laws, requirements for high school teachers, and funding for the state library. Nationally, we began the school hot lunch program and pushed for bookmobile libraries. FCE asked for and got money from the legislature to fund an OSU research study on the dental caries problem in Oregon. We've studied our county governments and monitored their activities; worked on county and state fair boards to improve their quality; sponsored programs on rural road safety, farm safety, home safety, bike safety, Defensive Driving courses, campaigns to get the drunk drivers off the road, and child seatbelt laws. Current educational programs focus on the environment, children and television, literacy, and global issues. Current concerns include addressing the growing need for food banks, for shelters for the homeless, and for reducing the violence against women and children. Oregon FCE members donate thousands of volunteer hours and dollars to these causes.
